2. SUMMARY

Our priorities for the year remain focused on teaching and providing information and we have continued our programmes for all grades of staff from student nurses to consultants. We have continued to expand our network of ADR Champions and now have a champion in each of the acute Trusts. Work is continuing to recruit Champions in community and mental health trusts.

There was a small decrease in the number of reports received which mirrored a national trend. Patient reports continue to rise and they now comprise just over 30% of all the reports received. A small rise in the number of reports received from GPs continues but there are still no electronic solutions for GP reporting for the majority of GPs in the region.

We presented 4 posters at the International Society of Pharmacovigilance annual meeting in Geneva and these were based on the work of University of Birmingham MPharm students during the year.



Figure 1: All Patient Reports (combined patient, carer, and parent reports)




Figure 2: All hospital Reports (Combination of hospital doctor, hospital nurse, hospital pharmacist & hospital other healthcare professional)




Figure 3: All Pharmacist Reports (Combination of pharmacist, community pharmacist, & hospital pharmacist).






Figure 4: Hospital Doctor Reports

Figure 6: All Nurse Reports (Nurse, and Hospital Nurse)






Figure 7: General Practitioner Reports

4. PROMOTIONAL ACTIVITIES

We have promoted the scheme with numerous talks and lectures during the year. Details of them are listed below.

Meetings

We attended the Reporter Groups meeting at the MHRA in June 2018 and the Annual General Meeting in September 2018.

We organised an ADR study day in November 2018 in Birmingham and this was targeted at ADR Champions and other interested parties. There were 6 lectures during the day including one giving

a patient's perspective on adverse drug reactions. There were 60 attendees from all over the region.

Social Media

We participated in ADR Awareness Week in November 2018. The week saw a big engagement on our Twitter feed. Our Tweets earned over 54,400 impressions during the week and the following 3 weeks compared with an average of 6,000 during a similar period before Awareness week. During the year our number of Twitter followers increased from 540 to 967.

We distributed regional reporting numbers to ADR champions via a quarterly report and also material for them to use during ADR Awareness Week in November 2018
